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Information on requirements to practise

In Canada, most occupations in information and communications technology (ICT) are **not regulated**, with the exception of the engineering occupations, which are all regulated in Canada. Therefore, employment is subject to demand, and qualification requirements are set by individual employers, who may require certification or training in specific software and hardware.

Information on assessment of qualifications

You should note that if you are already licensed to practise your occupation in a province or territory of Canada, and later wish to work in a non-regulated occupation, employers may request that you provide them with a formal assessment of your academic credentials.

If that is the case, or if you wish to have your credentials assessed **for a purpose other than practising a regulated occupation** in Canada, you may consult our <u>Fact Sheet No. 2</u>, "Assessment and recognition of credentials for the purpose of employment in Canada" and contact an <u>academic credential evaluation service</u>. Although evaluation services offer expert advice on how qualifications obtained abroad compare with academic credentials obtained in Canada, their evaluations are **advisory only and do not guarantee recognition** of your qualifications for employment or certification purposes in Canada. Please note that evaluation services charge a <u>fee for their assessments</u>.

Information on assessment for immigration purposes, under the Federal Skilled Worker Program (FSWP)

The Federal Skilled Worker Program (FSWP) is an immigration program administered by Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC), the department responsible for immigration to Canada.

CIC has <u>published the list of eligible occupations</u> under the FSWP. To apply for immigration to Canada under this program, one of the requirements* is to obtain an "Educational Credential Assessment" (ECA) for immigration purposes from a CIC-designated organization. We invite you to communicate directly with one of the <u>designated organizations</u> to begin this process from outside Canada.

*It is important to note that this requirement is for immigration purposes only. It is separate from the process to obtain a license to practice from the relevant regulatory body listed below. Obtaining a license to practice is not required to apply for immigration.
